Kentucky Commission on Human Rights To Hold Its Regular Meeting Thursday, September 18, 2025

Louisville – The Kentucky Commission on Human Rights (KCHR) Board will hold its regular meeting on **Thursday, September 18, 2025**. The meeting will be held at Kentucky Commission on Human Rights Conference Room located at 312 Whittington Parkway, Suite 020, Louisville, Kentucky at 9:00 a.m. (Eastern Standard Time) and virtually.

The Kentucky Commission on Human Rights is the state government authority that enforces the Kentucky Civil Rights Act (Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 344), and through its affiliations with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, enforces federal civil rights laws.

The Kentucky Civil Rights Act makes it unlawful to discriminate against people in the areas of employment, financial credit transactions, housing, and public accommodations. Discrimination is prohibited in these areas based on race, color, religion, national origin, gender, and disability. In employment, discrimination is further prohibited on the basis of age (40 years and over) and on the basis of tobacco-smoking status. In housing, discrimination is further prohibited based on familial status, which protects people with children in the household under the age of 18 years old, and it protects women who are pregnant. It is also a violation of the law to retaliate against a person for reporting or alleging discrimination.
