The event is designed to educate interested members of the public and to help people who work for immigrant and refugee centers, non-profit groups, colleges, universities, and people interested in working with immigrant Kentuckians. The summit presents an opportunity to learn about the services available to Kentuckians of other national origins and to learn about the needs of immigrant communities, residents, refugees, and citizens. The event can also be helpful to immigrant Kentuckians who need to learn more about services and opportunities available to them.

Topics at the summit will include housing, employment, education, business and more. The Kentucky Commission on Human Rights has produced the statewide summit since 2005. National Hispanic Heritage Month is annually recognized from Sept. 15 to Oct. 15.
